

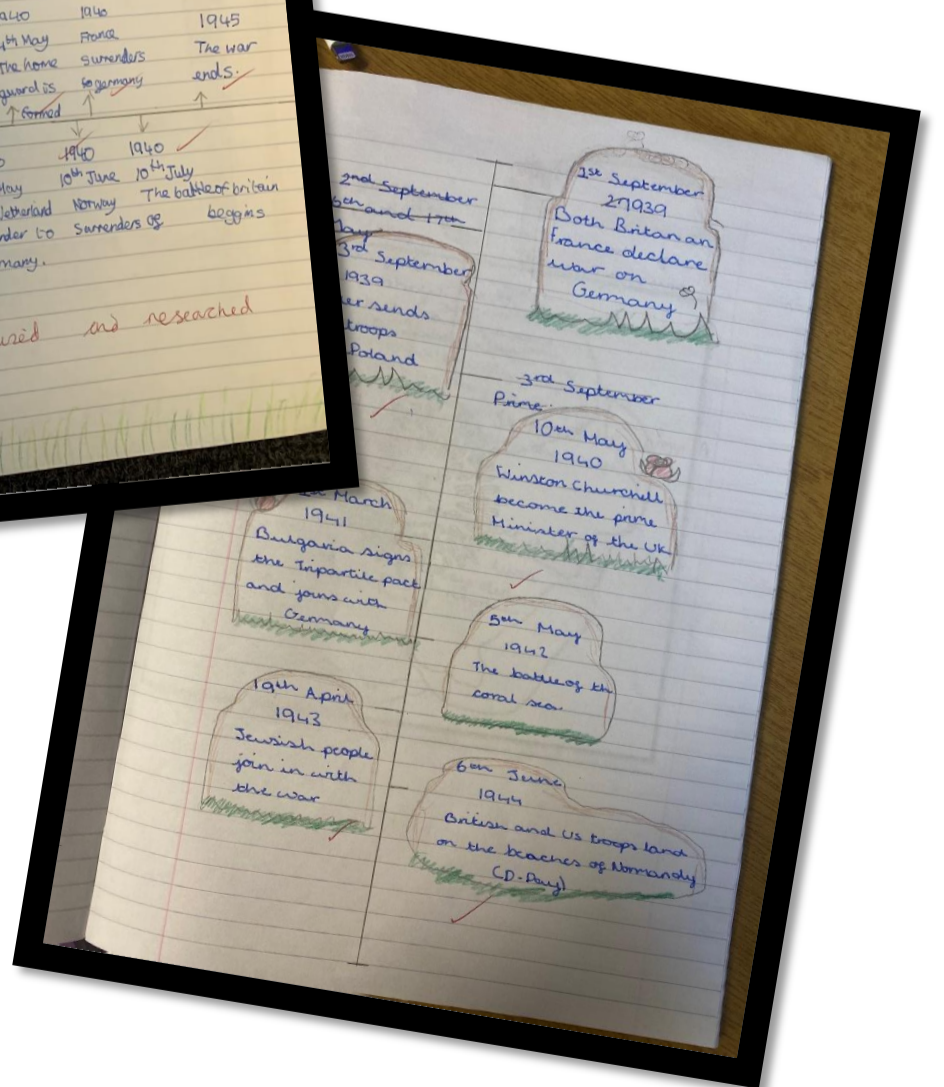
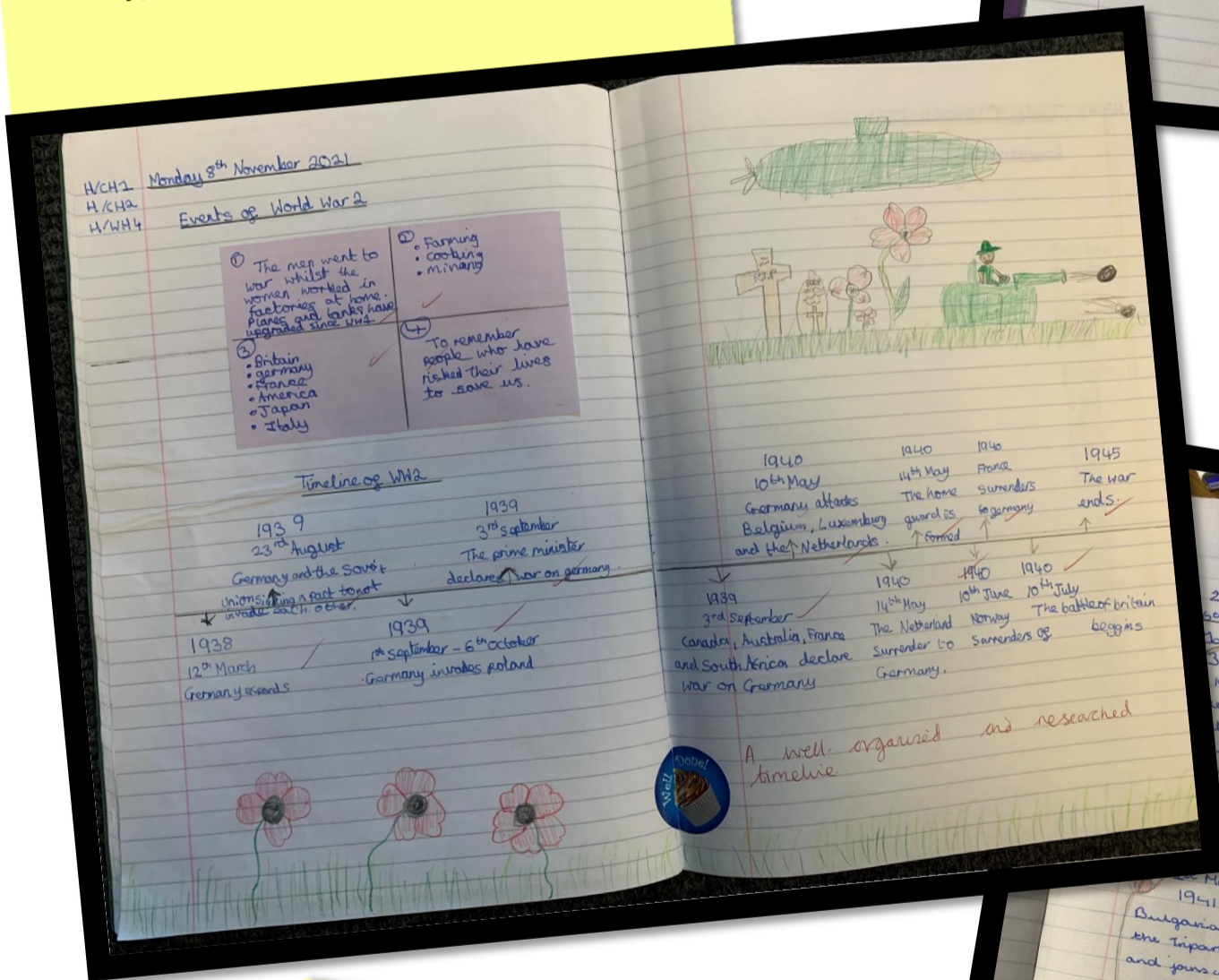
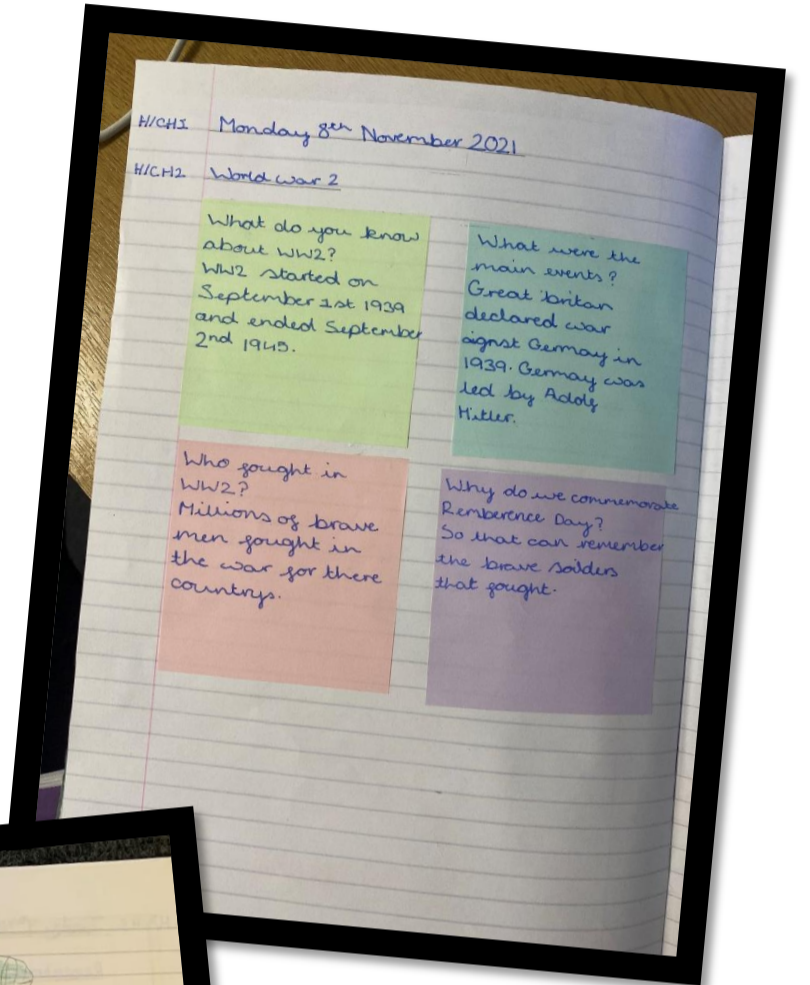
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Project Reflection – Autumn 2

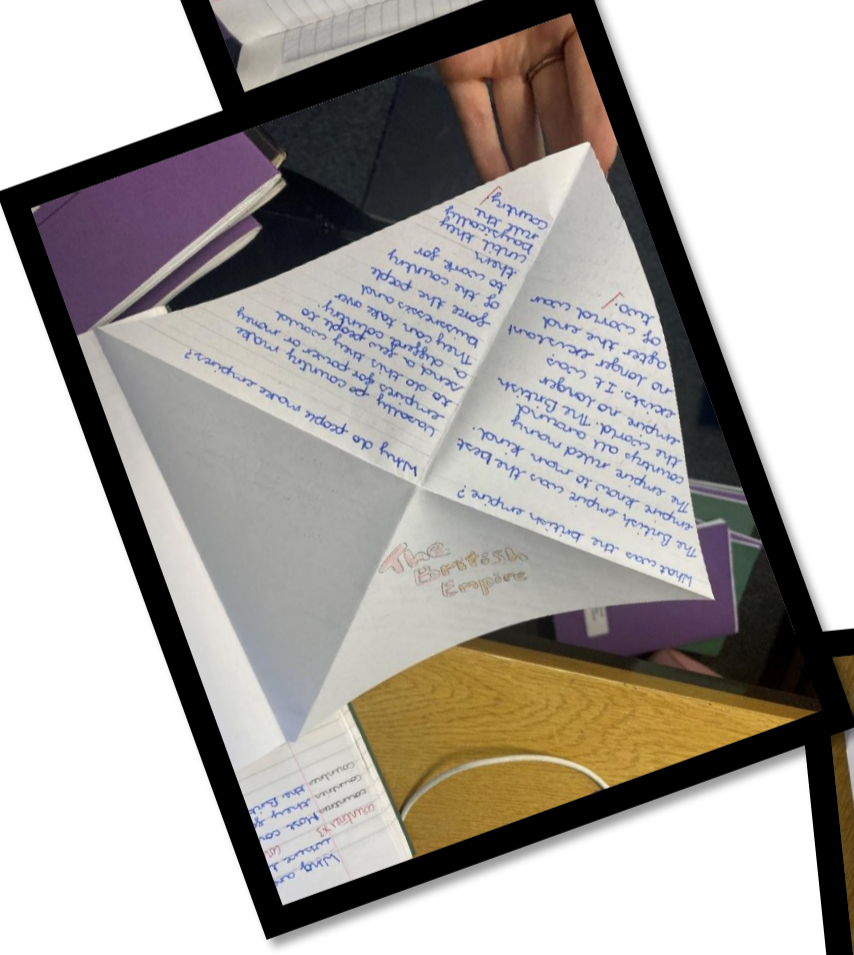

We then investigated the Windrush and how and why so many migrants came to live in the UK. We found out about how they were treated and the legacy of the Windrush generation.

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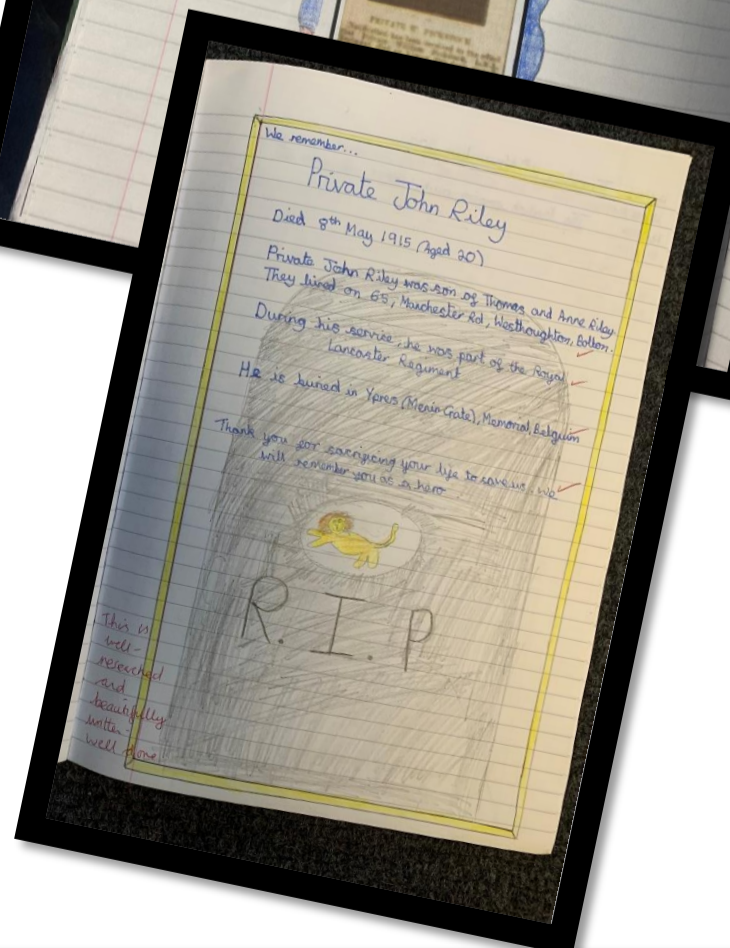
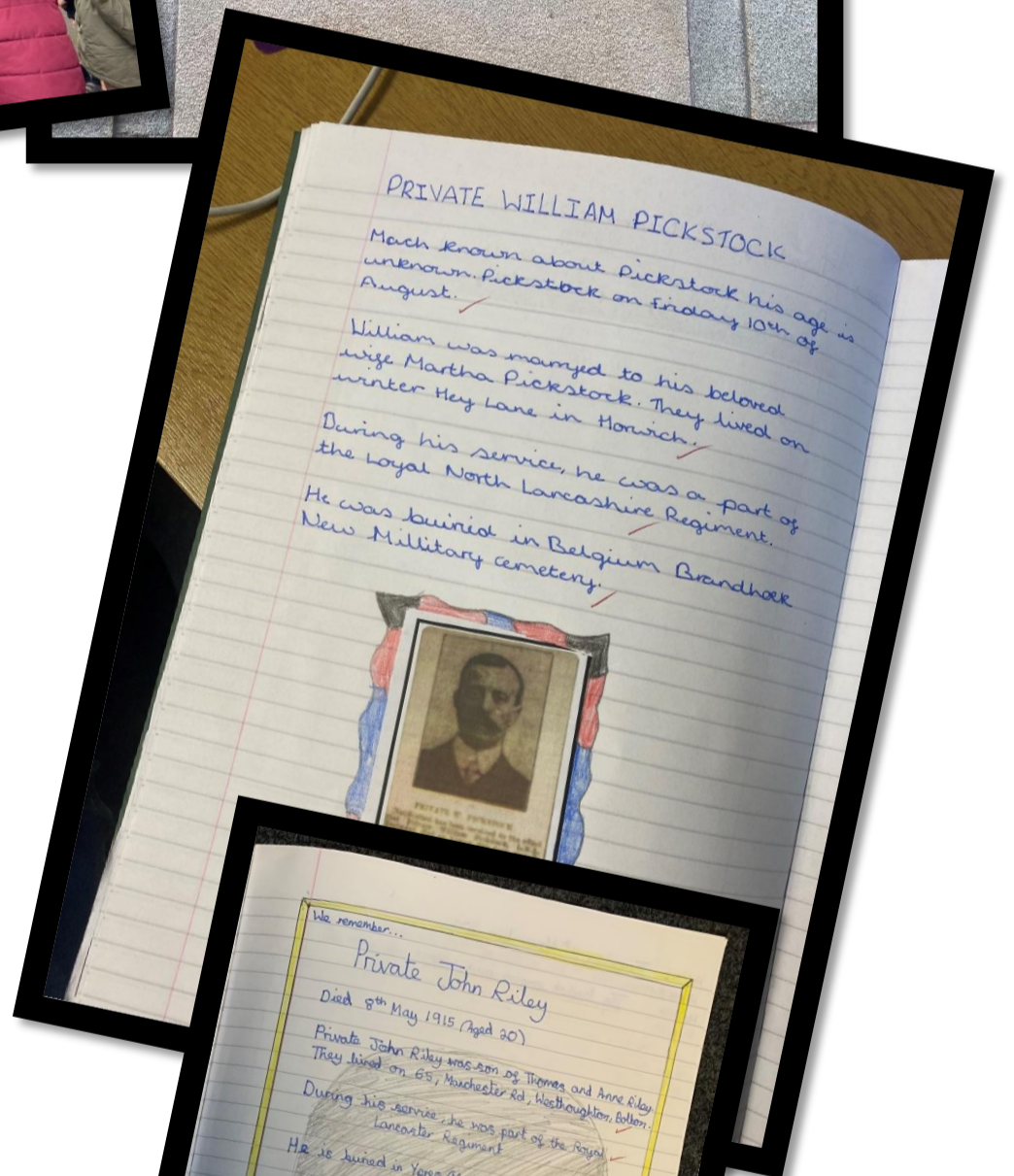


Remembrance
