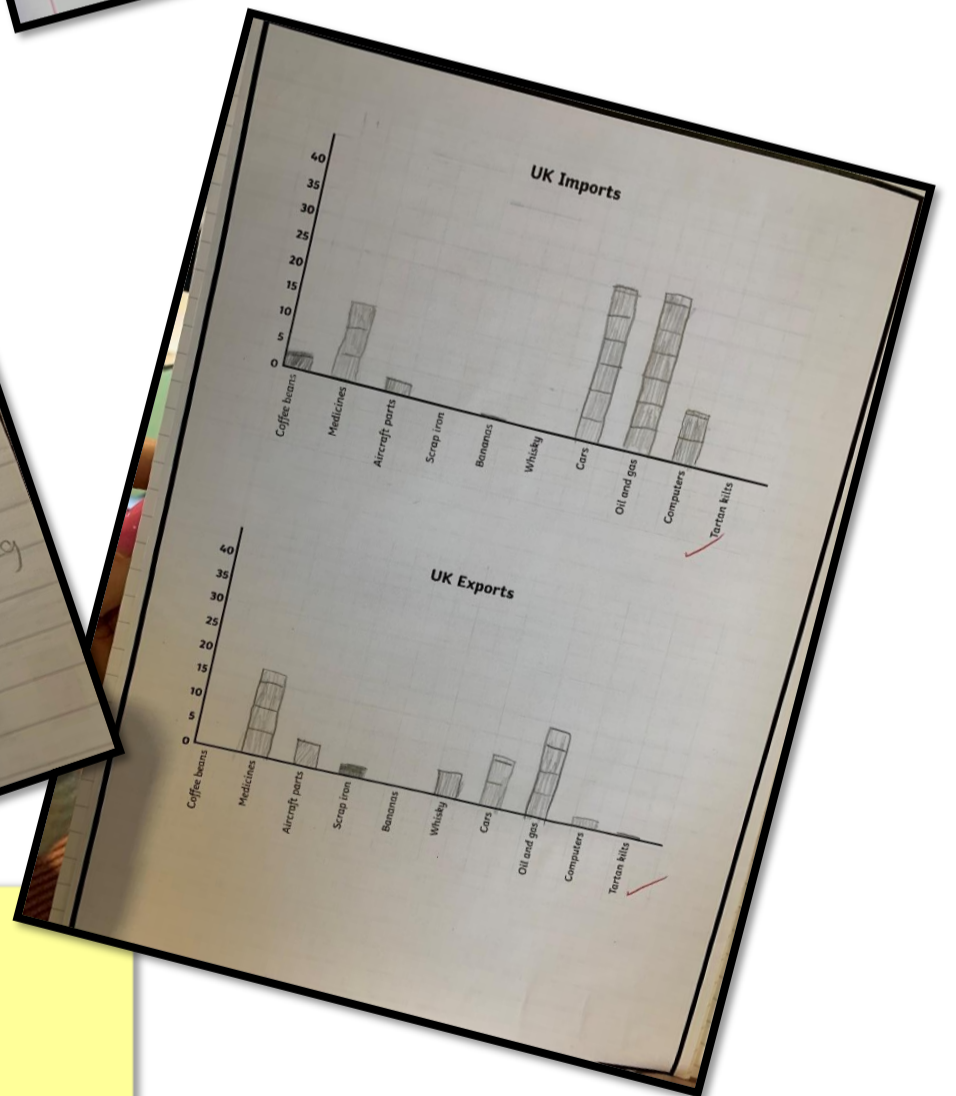
Why Do You Think The UK Needs To Import Goods?

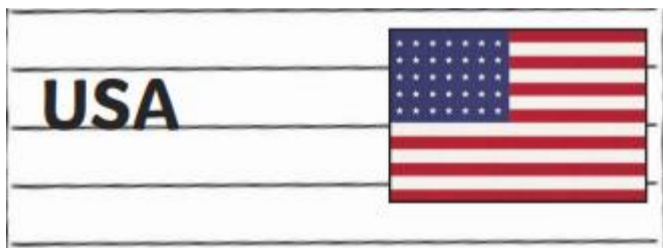

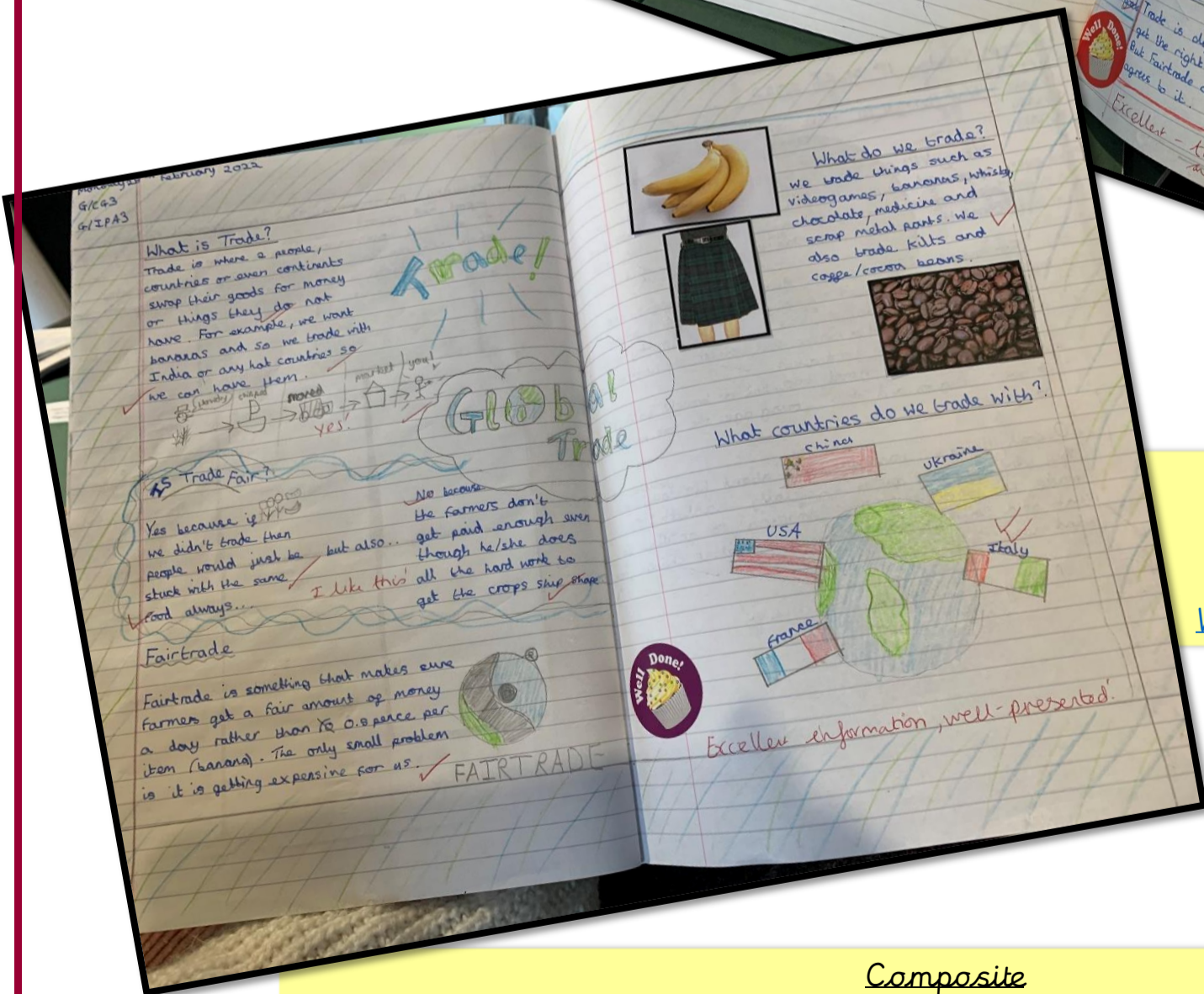
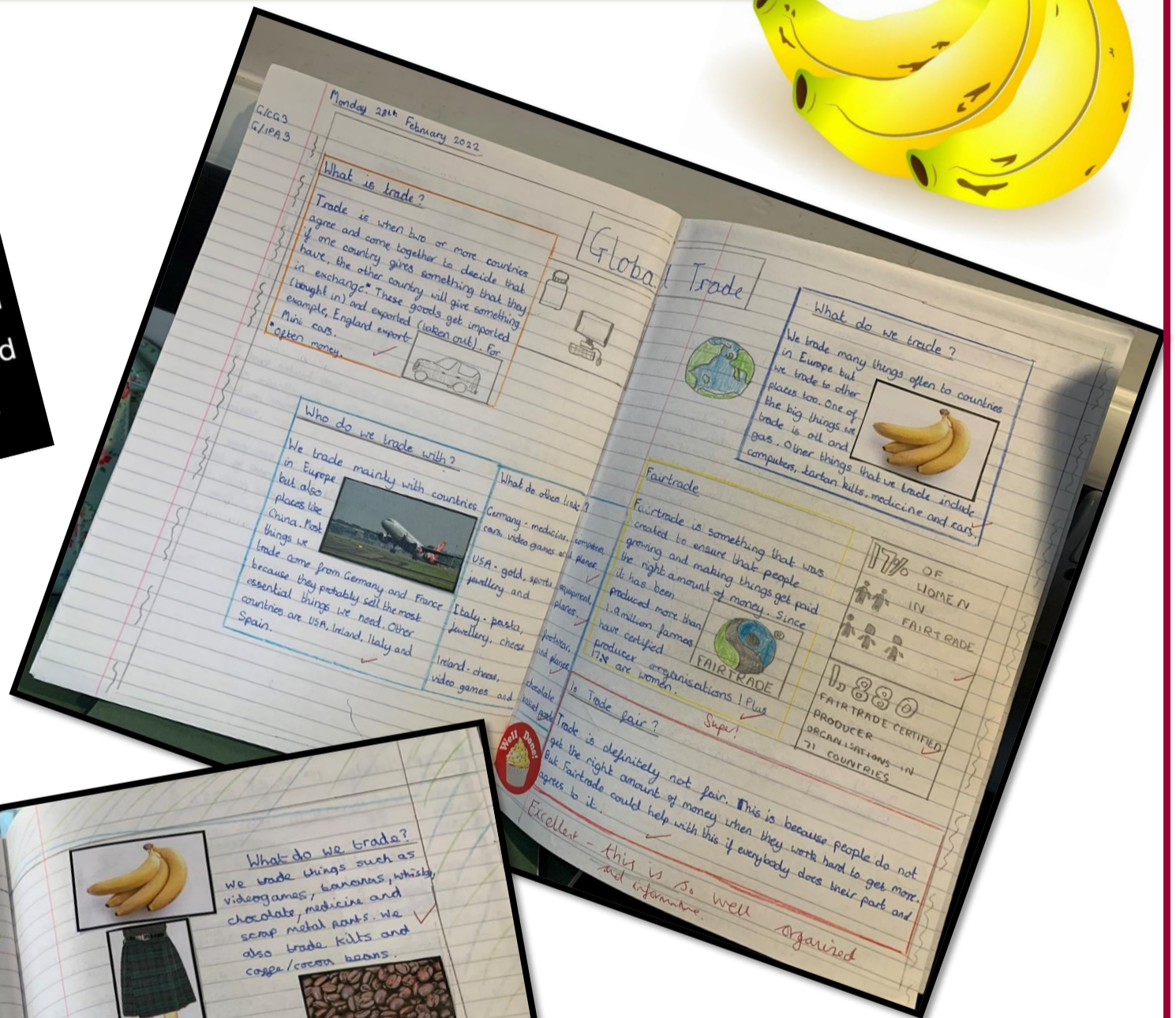
